The NDIS Act

The *National Disability Insurance Scheme Act 2013 (NDIS Act)* is the legislation which establishes:

- The National Disability Insurance Scheme, and
- The National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA).

Among other things, the NDIS Act sets out:

- The objects and principles under which the NDIS will operate
- How a person can become a participant in the NDIS
- How a participant's individual, goal-based plan is prepared and reviewed, including how the NDIA approves the funding of reasonable and necessary supports
- How a provider can become a registered NDIS provider
- The governance arrangements for the NDIA, including its CEO, Board, Independent Advisory Council, and Actuaries
- A process for internal and external review of certain decisions made under the NDIS Act.

The NDIS Rules

The <u>NDIS Rules</u> are legislative instruments made under the NDIS Act.

They set out the more detailed operation of the NDIS and accompany - and should be read in conjunction with - the NDIS Act.

Among others, there are NDIS Rules on:

- Becoming a Participant
- Supports for Participants
- Children
- Nominees
- Plan Management
- <u>Registered Providers of Supports</u>
- Protection and Disclosure of Information
- Inter-governmental agreements
