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

Overview

This report is a summary of the performance and operations of the NDIA in Victoria for Quarter 1 of 2019-20 (01 July 2019 - 30 September 2019).

It is the thirteenth quarterly report during the NDIS Transition period, which commenced on 1 July 2016.

Mainstream Interface

An additional 7,852 active participants received plans this quarter (excluding ECEI).

At 30 September 2019, plans approved and ECEI referrals represent 81% of scheme to date bilateral estimate.

Participant satisfaction remained high in the quarter, with 88% of participants surveyed rating their satisfaction with the Agency's planning process as either 'Good' or 'Very Good'. The following amounts have been paid to providers and participants: • \$32.5m in 2013-14.

- \$128.2m in 2014-15.
- \$161.5m in 2015-16,
- \$338.2m in 2016-17,
- \$961.1m in 2017-18,
- \$2,308.9m in 2018-19,
- \$711.1m in 2019-20 to date.

Overall,

- 61% of committed supports were utilised in 2013-14,
- 79% in 2014-15,
- 79% in 2015-16,
- 67% in 2016-17,
- 66% in 2017-18,
- 66% in 2018-19.

The 2018-19 and 2019-20 experience is still emerging.

Lower utilisation during transition reflects the increased amount of participants who received their first plans in these years. Participants tend to utilise less of their first plan, compared with their second and subsequent plans, as it takes time to familiarise with the NDIS and decide which supports to use. There were 4,578 active providers as at 30 September 2019.

37% of active providers are individuals/sole traders.

25% of active providers are receiving 85-95% of payments to providers made by the NDIA.

The NDIS Quality and Safeguards Commission (NQSC) has been established to regulate providers in NSW and SA from 1 July 2018, and all other jurisdictions from 1 July 2019 except for WA, which will commence from 1 July 2020. 93% of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1 access mainstream services.

Note: Jurisdiction is defined by the current residing address of the participant. This is a change from the previous quarter, where the jurisdiction was based on where the participant resided when they had their initial plan approved. This change may affect comparability to the prior quarter.

Participants and Planning

The NDIS in Victoria continues to grow with 7,852 additional active participants with approved plans this quarter.

In total, over 84,000 participants are being supported by the NDIS in Victoria, with 26% receiving support for the first time.




Quarterly Intake

2019-20 Q1

Of the 8,093 participants active and deemed 'eligible' this quarter, 68% were 'New' participants (i.e. had not transitioned from an existing State/Territory program).

Of the 7,852 new active participants this quarter, 53% were 'New' participants (i.e. had not transitioned from an existing State/Territory program), 74% entered with a permanent disability.

Note: The definition used to report on children being supported in the ECEI gateway has changed compared with the last quarter due to improvements in data collection. This is the result of the introduction of new ICT capability. While the total number of children being supported in the ECEI gateway is accurate, the information on the timing of supports provided will improve going forward. Therefore, the results based on those who commenced receiving supports in the quarter should be treated with caution.


Quarterly Intake Detail

Plan approval numbers have increased from 77,589 at the end of 2018-19 Q4 to 85,444 by the end of 2019-20 Q1, an increase of 7,855 approvals.

At the end of the quarter, 200 children are receiving initial supports in the ECEI gateway.

Overall, 1,595 participants with approved plans have exited the Scheme, resulting in 84,049 active participants (including ECEI) as at 30 September 2019.

There were 15,336 plan reviews this quarter. This figure relates to all participants who have entered the scheme.



Change in plan approvals between 30 June 2019 and 30 September 2019




Cumulative Position

At the end of 2019-20 Q1, the cumulative total number of active participants that are receiving support is 84,049 (including 200 children receiving initial supports in the ECEI gateway). Of these, 54,719 transitioned from an existing State/Territory program, 7,497 transitioned from an existing Commonwealth program and 21,633 participants have received support for the first time.

Overall, since 1 July 2013, there have been 110,006 people with access decisions.

Cumulative position reporting is inclusive of trial participants for the reported period and represents participants who were active at the end of each period.




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


These bar charts show the demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2019, by age group.



Participant Profiles by Disability Group


These bar charts show the demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2019, by disability group.

Of the participants entering in this quarter, 16% had a primary disability of Developmental Delay compared with 7% in previous quarters. The large increase was mainly driven by the increase in participants aged 0 to 6 years entering in this quarter.

For participants with a plan approval in this quarter:


• 39% of active participants had a relatively high level of function

• 42% of active participants had a relatively moderate level of function

• 20% had a relatively low level of function

These relativities are within the NDIS participant population, and not comparable to the general population.

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Participant Profiles by Gender

These charts show the demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2019, by gender.

The majority of participants are males. Consistent with population data, this is driven by autism and developmental delay where prevalence rates are higher for males compared with females.

These bar charts show other demographic profiles of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2019.


Of the participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1:

• 3.0% were Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, compared with 2.4% in previous periods combined.

• 14.6% were culturally and linguistically diverse, compared with 10.0% in previous periods combined.

• There were 1,182 participants in residential aged care, 973 of them were under the age of 65 years.






Plan Management Support Coordination

The proportion of participants electing to fully or partly self-manage their plan was higher in 2019-20 Q1 at 34%, compared with 31% in previous quarters combined.

44% of participants who have had a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1 have support coordination in their plan, compared to 45% in previous quarters combined.

Plan Activation


Plan activation refers to the amount of time between a participant's initial plan being approved, and the date the participant first receives support. In-kind supports are included.


The percentage of participants who activated plans within 90 days of initial plan approval was:

- 84% of participants entering in 2018-19 Q3
- 87% of participants entering in previous quarters combined

Note: Participants with initial plans approved after the end of 2018-19 Q3 have been excluded from the charts. They are relatively new and it is too early to examine their durations to activation.

Plan activation figures are approximations based on payment data. As there is a lag between when the support is provided to a participant, and the payment being made, these statistics are a conservative estimate; it is likely plan activation is faster than presented.

Participant Outcomes

This information on participant outcomes has been collected from 98.7% of participants who have received their initial plan since 1 July 2016 (when they entered the scheme).


• 60% of participants aged 0 to before school are able to make friends outside of family/carers, compared to 58% of participants from school age to 14

• 52% of participants aged 0 to before school are engaged in age appropriate community, cultural or religious activities, compared to 32% - 36% for other age groups
• 65% of participants from school age to 14 attend school in a mainstream class, compared to 30% of participants aged 15 to 24

21% of participants aged 25 and over have a paid job, compared to 15% of participants aged 15 to 24
65% of participants aged 25 and over choose what they

do every day, compared to 42% of participants aged 15 to 24


• able to advocate for their child/family member was highest for participants aged 0 to 14 (73%)

who feel in control selecting services was equal for participants aged 15 to 24 and 25 and over (35%)
who support/plan for their family member through life

stage transitions was highest for participants aged 0 to 14 (84%)

Has the NDIS helped? Participants

This data reflects participants' perceptions on whether engagement with the NDIS has helped them.

The NDIA asks the question 'Has the NDIS helped?' to individuals when they enter and at their subsequent plan reviews. These charts summarise the responses for participants who entered the Scheme between 1 October 2016 and 30 September 2017 and have had a first and second plan review to date.

Participant perceptions in general improved from first review to second review of participation in the NDIS. The greatest improvements across most age groups were demonstrated within the 'Daily living' domain. However, for the 'Work' domain, the results deteriorated from first review to second review.






This data reflects participants' perceptions on whether engagement with the NDIS has helped them.

The NDIA asks the question 'Has the NDIS helped?' to individuals when they enter and at their subsequent plan reviews. These charts summarise the responses for participants who entered the Scheme between 1 July 2016 and 30 September 2016 and have had a first, second and third plan review to date.

Participant perceptions from the first to the third plan review have improved for school age to 14 and 25 and over surveyed in the domains of Daily Living, Relationships, Social, community and civic participation.

The number of participants is relatively small by age group. However, the volume of survey results collected and included in these tables will continue to grow over time.



Overall, the perception of families and carers was that participant outcomes have improved from the first to the second plan review with the NDIS.



The NDIA asks the question 'Has the NDIS helped?' to families and carers of participants when they enter and at their subsequent plan reviews. These charts summarise the responses for participants who entered the Scheme between 1 July 2016 and 30 September 2016 and have had a first, second and third plan review to date.

Overall, the perceptions of families and carers was that participant outcomes had improved from the first to the third plan review with the NDIS. The one exception was the response to the question 'Has the NDIS helped you with your health and wellbeing?' for the 0 to 14 age group.

The number of participants is relatively small by age group. However, the volume of survey results collected and included in these tables will continue to grow over time.




Participants in Work


The NDIA is acutely aware of the benefits that employment brings to participants and tracks employment outcomes to see whether the NDIS has helped participants to find paid work.

Baseline measures on employment are collected as a participant enters the Scheme and at their subsequent plan reviews. The first chart relates to participants who have entered the Scheme between 1 October 2016 and 30 September 2017, and have had two plan reviews to date. The second chart relates to participants who have entered the Scheme between 1 July 2016 and 30 September 2016, and have had three plan reviews to date.

The percentage of participants in paid work has generally increased across plan reviews for those aged 15 to 24, but has remained stable for those aged 25 and over. NDIS participants in paid employment, by age group – participants with first and second plan reviews




Participants involved in community and social activities


The number of participants engaging in community and social activities is one of the key measures for ensuring quality experiences and outcomes for participants.

Baseline measures on engaging in community and social activities are collected as a participant enters the Scheme and at their subsequent plan reviews. The first chart relates to participants who have entered the Scheme between 1 October 2016 and 30 September 2017, and have had two plan reviews to date. The second chart relates to participants who have entered the Scheme between 1 July 2016 and 30 September 2016, and have had three plan reviews to date.

Access


A new participant satisfaction survey has been developed to better record the experience of NDIS participants and their families and carers at different stages of the participant pathway.


It began roll-out on 1 September 2018 and will become the primary tool for analysing participant experience. The new survey is designed to gather data at the four primary stages of the participant pathway:

Access

- Pre-planning
- Planning
- Plan Review

Generally, there have been improvements in participant satisfaction at each stage of the pathway in this guarter, except for the Pre-Planning stage. There is still work required to improve participant understanding of the NDIS process and what happens next for individuals at each stage of the process.





Committed Supports and Payments

Both committed and paid supports to participants are increasing in line with the growing scheme.

Of the \$7.2 billion that has been committed in participant plans, \$4.6 billion has been paid to date.


Committed Supports and Payments






Committed Supports by Cost Band

Distribution of average annualised committed supports by cost band (including SIL)




Distribution of average annualised committed supports by cost band (excluding SIL)





Committed Supports by Age Band



Utilisation of Committed Supports

This data demonstrates the utilisation of committed supports by the year they were expected to be provided as at 30 June 2019 and 30 September 2019.


As there is a lag between when support is provided and when it is paid, the utilisation in 2018-19 and 2019-20 will increase.

Experience shows that participants utilise less of their first plan, compared with their second and subsequent plans, as it takes time to familiarise with the NDIS and decide which supports to use.

There were a large number of participants who received their first plan in 2016-17, 2017-18 and 2018-19 which largely explains why utilisation rates are lower in these periods.

Experience for 2018-19 and 2019-20 is still emerging.

Providers and Markets

The provider network grows in scale and diversity, increasing participants' access to high quality services.

There were a total of 4,578 active providers as at 30 September 2019, 703 of which were active for the first time in the quarter.

The new NDIS Quality and Safeguard Commission (NQSC) commenced to regulate quality and safeguarding of NDIS supports and services. The NQSC has been active in all States and Territories across Australia with the exception for WA, which will commence from 1 July 2020.



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Summary

This section contains information focused on active service providers and the market, with key provider and market indicators presented.

Provider registration

- From 1 July 2019, providers in all States and Territories across Australia (except WA) register with the NQSC by submitting a registration request, indicating the types of support they are accredited to provide. The NQSC will commence operating in WA from 1 July 2020.
- The NQSC uses a 'National approach' to approve providers and thus, any provider which has been verified in any other States or Territories (with the exception of WA) is automatically approved in Victoria.

How providers interact with participants

- NDIS participants have the flexibility to choose the providers who support them.
- Providers are paid for disability supports and services provided to the participants.


As at 30 September 2019, there were 4,578 active service providers, of which 1,694 were individual/sole trader operated businesses and 2,884 were companies or organisations.

The registration groups with the largest numbers of active providers continue to grow:


• Therapeutic Supports: from 2,062 to 2,386 (16% increase)

Household tasks: from 909 to 1,090 (20% increase)

• Participation in community, social and civic activities: from 662 to 833 (26% increase)

• Daily Personal Activities: from 594 to 758 (28% increase)

• Assistance in coordinating or managing life stages, transitions and supports: from 581 to 710 (22% increase)








Market share of top providers




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Mainstream Interface

Of the total number of active participants with a plan approved in 2019-20 Q1, 93% access mainstream services, an increase from prior quarters. Participants are accessing mainstream services predominantly for health and wellbeing, daily activities and lifelong learning.
