In interpreting monthly results, it is important to understand:

- **1. Seasonality** monthly payments vary due to seasonality. For example, payments are lower in months where there are school holidays (such as July), and the number of days in the month also impacts monthly payments. Comparisons should therefore only be made between the same corresponding period or periods.
- 2. Changing mix of participants that is, the profile of participants changes over time. While the overall number of participants in the Scheme continues to increase, there is a greater proportion of children in the Scheme, and a lower proportion of participants in Supported Independent Living (SIL) than there was a year ago. All else equal, this means that that the average participant payment decreases over time just because of this changing mix. Hence, when comparing payments at two points in time this needs to be considered.
- **3. Average payments** have increased by 3% from July 2020 to July 2021 (from \$51,750 to \$53,400), despite the change in mix of participants that has a downward impact on overall average spend per participant.

As part of its ongoing commitment to transparency, the Agency will be releasing the above information each month including the year-to-date figures.
