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

Overview

This report is the fifth quarterly report during the NDIS Transition period, which commenced on 1 July 2016.





Summary

Participants and Planning

As at 30 September 2017, there were 3,982 participants with approved plans.

As at 30 September 2017, plans approved represent 75% of scheme to date bilateral estimate met (1 July 2014 - 30 September 2017).

The satisfaction rating remained high with 86% of participants surveyed in the quarter rating their satisfaction with the Agency's planning process either good or very good.

Committed Supports and Payments

\$408.8 million of supports has been committed to 3,982 participants. This includes \$258.1 million of supports in respect of prior financial years including trial, \$146.8 million of supports in respect of 2017-18^ and \$3.9 million of supports in respect of later years*.

\$217.3 million has been paid to providers and participants.

Overall, 58% in 2014-15 and 74% in 2015-16. Currently utilisation is 75% in 2016-17, although this will likely increase as there is a lag between when support is provided and when it is paid.

Providers and Markets

850 approved providers, a 12% increase during the quarter.

65-90% of payments made by the NDIA are received by 25% of providers.

20% of services providers are individual/sole traders.

Mainstream Interface

96% of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q1 access mainstream services.

The proportion of participants entering in the current quarter accessing mainstream services is higher compared to prior quarters.

Participants and Planning

As the transition phase to full scheme continues, the NDIS in Western Australia continues to grow with 200 additional participants with approved plans this quarter.

The NDIS is transitioning to full-scheme in line with phasing schedules bilaterally agreed by State/Territory and Commonwealth governments.


Of the 135 participants deemed 'eligible' this quarter, 84% were 'new' participants (i.e. had not transitioned from an existing State/Territory or Commonwealth program).

Of the 200 plan approvals this quarter, 72% were 'new' participants (i.e. had not transitioned from an existing State/Territory or Commonwealth program) and 64% entered with a permanent disability.

Overall, since 1 July 2014, there have been 4,889 people with access decisions, and 3,982 participants with an approved plan.









Quarterly Intake Detail


Plan approvals as at 30 September 2017

Plan approval numbers have increased from 3,782 at the end of 2016-17 Q4 to 3,982 by the end of 2017-18 Q1. This is an increase of 200 approvals.

As at 30 September 2017 there were 66 exits bringing the overall number to 3,916.

In the quarter of 2017-18 Q1 there were 531 plan reviews. This figure relates to all participants who have entered the scheme (including transition).

Cumulative Position


Plan approvals as at 30 September 2017

As at the end of 2017-18 Q1, the cumulative total number of participants receiving support was 3,982. Of these, 1,885 transitioned from an existing State/Territory program and 71 transitioned from an existing Commonwealth program.

In addition, 225 participants were awaiting a plan as at 30 September 2017.

Cumulative position reporting is inclusive of trial participants for the reported period and represents participants who have or have had an approved plan.







Plan approvals by participant referral pathway






Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in the quarter of 2017-18 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2017.


Around 35% of participants entering in this quarter are aged 0 to 6 years. This is higher compared to prior quarters.

% of active participants with a plan approved by age group






Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in the quarter of 2017-18 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2017.

- % of active participants approved in 2017-18 Q1




Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in the quarter of 2017-18 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2017.

For participants with a plan approval in the current period:

- 43% of active participants had a relatively high level of function
- 38% of active participants had a relatively moderate level of function
- 20% had a relatively low level of function

These relativities are within the NDIS participant population, and not comparable to the general population.


% of active participants with a plan approved by level of function

Demographic profile of active participants with a plan approved in the quarter of 2017-18 Q1, compared with plan approvals as at 30 June 2017.








Plan Management Support Co-ordination

The proportion of participants who are fully or partly self-managing their plan was higher in 2017-18 Q1 (28%) compared with the prior quarters of 2016-17 (24%), and 74% of participants who have had a plan approved in 2017-18 Q1 have support coordination in their plan, compared with 81% in prior quarters of 2016-17.


Support Co-ordination

Plan Activation


Plan activation refers to the amount of time between plan approval and the commencement of the participant receiving support.

The percentage of plans activated within 90 days of approval were:

- 74% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q1
- 73% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q2
- 78% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q3
- 76% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q4

Plan activation can only be approximated using data on payments. As there is a lag between when support is provided and payments made, these statistics are likely to be conservative. That is, it is likely that plan activation is faster than presented. Further, in-kind supports have been excluded from the calculation, which further contributes to the conservative figures.

Note: Given that plans approved in 2017-18 Quarter 1 are relatively new, it would be too early to examine the duration to plan activation for these plans and hence these have been excluded from the charts.



Participant Outcomes

Baseline outcome measures were collected from 98% of participants receiving their initial plan since 1 July 2016.

Of participants aged 25 and over:

- 54% choose who supports them
- 53% want more choice and control in their life
- 78% are happy with their home and feel safe or very safe there
- 39% were actively involved in a community group in the past year

For family/carers of children aged 0 to 14:

- 46% have a paid job
- 44% say they are able to work as much as they want
- 54% say they are able to see family and friends as much as they want

Key measures on baseline social, economic and independence outcomes. These will be monitored into the future.


Participants aged 0 to before school:

- 61% were able to make friends outside of family/carers
- 43% involved in age appropriate community, cultural or religious activities

Participants aged 25 and over:

- 27% had a paid job
- 69% choose what they do every day

Participant Outcomes


Responses to the "Has the NDIS helped?" questions.

Participants who entered the Scheme in 2016-17 Q1 and had their plan reviewed in 2017-18 Q1 were asked questions about whether the NDIS had helped them.

"Has the NDIS helped?" questions





Participant Satisfaction

86% of participants rated their satisfaction with the Agency planning process as either good or very good in the current quarter. This has increased since the second last quarter.

The Participant Pathway Review aims to improve the participant experience.

Participant satisfaction continues to be high, but has dropped during transition, compared with trial site experience. Proportion of participants describing satisfaction with the agency's planning process as good or very good - by quarter

Both committed and paid supports to participants are increasing in line with the growing scheme.

To date funding committed to participants with an approved plan amounts to \$408.8 million (including support periods in the future), of which \$217.3 million has been paid.

The \$408.8 million committed support includes \$258.1 million of supports in respect of prior financial years including trial, \$146.8 million of supports in respect of 2017-18^ and \$3.9 million of supports in respect of later years*.

Of the \$408.8 million that has been committed in participant plans, \$217.3 million has been paid to date.



A lower proportion of initial plan approvals in 2017-18 Q1 have average annualised committed supports greater than \$20,000 compared with participants who entered in prior quarters when participants with shared supported accommodation (SSA) supports are included.


This is also the case when SSA participants are excluded.

This is driven by the concentration of approvals in the 0-6 year and 7-14 year age groups. Due to low number of plan approvals this quarter the results should be interpreted with caution.

Distribution of average annualised committed supports by cost band (excluding SSA)






Average annualised committed supports increase steeply up to age 25, stabilises to age 55 and then decreases for participants aged 65 and over.

Average annualised committed supports is high in the current quarter for participants at older ages, with the largest increase for participants aged 45 to 54. Average annualised committed supports is lower in the current quarter for participants aged 0 to 14.

This is likely to reflect the phasing schedules outlined in the bilateral agreements.

Average annualised committed supports by age band





Participants with Spinal Cord Injury, Acquired Brain Injury and Intellectual Disability have the highest average annualised committed supports while participants with Other Sensory/Speech, Hearing Impairment and Developmental Delay have the lowest average annualised committed supports.

Participants with an initial plan approval in 2017-18 Q1 had lower average annualised committed supports across a range of disability types, excluding Cerebal Palsy, when compared with participants who entered in prior quarters.

Average annualised committed supports by primary disability group





The average annualised committed supports generally increase for participants with lower levels of function.

The average annualised committed supports for participants with an initial plan approval in 2017-18 Q1 is lower compared with participants who entered in prior quarters for participants across low, medium and high levels of function.



Utilisation of committed supports by year that the support was expected to be provided as at 30 June 2017, compared with 30 September 2017.

As there is a lag between when support is provided and when it is paid, the utilisation in 2016-17 and 2017-18 will increase, the latter significantly so.

The utilisation of committed supports has decreased for supports provided in 2016-17. This is due to payments in 2017-18 Q1 for supports which were provided during 2016-17.



Providers and Markets

The scale and extent of the market continues to grow, with a 12% increase in the number of providers during the quarter to 850.





Providers and Markets

This section contains information on registered service providers and the market, with key provider and market indicators presented.

Provider registration

- To provide supports to NDIS participants, a service provider is required to register and be approved by the NDIA.
- Providers register with the NDIA by submitting a registration request, indicating the types of support (registration groups) they are accredited to provide.
- Providers are approved to deliver disability supports and services to participants of the NDIS if they have at least one registration group approved.

How providers interact with participants

- NDIS participants have the flexibility to choose the providers who support them.
- Providers are paid for disability supports and services provided to the participants.





Providers and Markets

Increase in number of providers over time.

As at 30 September 2017, there were 850 registered service providers of which 169 were individual/sole trader operated business while the remaining 681 providers were registered as a company or organisation.










Providers and Markets

Change in the activity status of providers.

As at 30 September 2017, 49% of providers were active in the last quarter, 45% were yet to have evidence of activity and 6% were inactive. Of the overall stock of providers, 91 providers began delivering new supports in the quarter.




Registration groups

The increase in approved providers from 30 June 2017 to 30 September 2017 varies by registration group.

Assistance products for personal care and safety has the highest number of approved service providers and has seen a 22% increase since the previous quarter.

The largest percentage increase in approved providers was for the Specialised Disability Accommodation registration group in the quarter. This was followed by Interpreting and translation, Innovative Community Participation and Assistive equipment for recreation.



■ As at 30 September 2017 ■ As at 30 June 2017




Market share of top providers


The proportion of participants entering in the current quarter accessing mainstream services is higher compared to prior quarters.






Mainstream Interface

96% of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q1 access mainstream services, an increase from prior quarters. Participants are accessing mainstream services predominantly for health and wellbeing, lifelong learning and daily activities.
