














5. Average annualised committed support - most recent approved plans





4.4 Total annualised committed support for active participants with a function score and an approved plan by level of function (%)







7.5 Distribution of active participants with an approved plan by level of function for age 0 - 6 yrs








7.8 Total annualised committed support for active participants with an approved plan by support category for age 0-6 yrs


7.15 Distribution of active participants with an approved plan by annualised committed support band for age 7 to 14 yrs



7.14 Distribution of active participants with an approved plan by primary disability for age 7 to 14 yrs










7.22 Distribution of active participants with an approved plan by primary disability for age 15 to 24 yrs








7.24 Total annualised committed support for active participants with an approved plan by support category for age 15 to 24 yrs






7.29 Distribution of active participants with an approved plan by level of function for age 25+ yrs
