Summary

The following are the key statistics discussed in this report:

Participants and Planning

As at 30 September 2017, there were 13,223 participants with approved plans (including children in the ECEI gateway).

As at 30 September 2017, plans approved and ECEI referrals represent:

- 103% of year to date bilateral estimate met (1 July 2017 to 30 September 2017)
- 112% of transition to date bilateral estimate met (1 July 2016 to 30 September 2017)
- 95% of scheme to date bilateral estimate met (1 July 2013 to 30 September 2017)

The satisfaction rating remained high with 83% of participants surveyed in the quarter rating their satisfaction with the Agency's planning process either good or very good.

Committed Supports and Payments

\$553.7 million of supports has been committed to 12,991 participants. This includes \$354.9 million of supports in respect of prior financial years including trial, \$187.4 million of supports in respect of 2017-18 and \$11.4 million of supports in respect of later years.

\$231.3 million has been paid to providers and participants.

Overall, 53% of committed supports were utilised in 2013-14, 61% in 2014-15 and 62% in 2015-16. Currently utilisation is 55% in 2016-17, although this will likely increase as there is a lag between when support is provided and when it is paid.

Providers and Markets

1,331 approved providers, a 15% increase during the quarter.

75-95% of payments made by the NDIA are received by 25% of providers.

34% of services providers are individual/sole traders.

Mainstream Interface

89% of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q1 access mainstream services.

The proportion of participants entering in the current quarter accessing mainstream services is lower compared to prior quarters.

PART 1: Participants and Planning

As the transition phase to full scheme continues, the NDIS in South Australia continues to grow with 1,359 additional participants with approved plans this quarter.

232 children were in the ECEI gateway at 30 September 2017. Of these, 222 were previously confirmed as ECEI at 30 June 2017 and an additional 10 entered the gateway this quarter.

Participants and Planning

The NDIS is transitioning to full-scheme in line with phasing schedules bilaterally agreed by State/Territory and Commonwealth governments.

There are three charts. The first chart displays the number of participants with access met (Eligible) by Participant Entry point. The second chart displays the number of participants with approved plans by Participant Entry Point. The third chart displays the number of participants with approved plans by Participant Pathway Type.

Of the 2,259 participants deemed 'eligible' this quarter 66% entered from an existing State/Territory program.

Of the 1,359 plan approvals this quarter, 52% had transitioned from an existing State/Territory program and 74% entered with a permanent disability.

Overall, since 1 July 2013, there have been 18,208 people with access decisions, and 13,223 participants with an approved plan (including children in the ECEI gateway).

Note: Of the 1,359 initial plans approved this quarter, 251 were previously confirmed as ECEI at 30 June 2017.

Quarterly Intake Detail

Page: 7

A chart displays the change in plan approvals between the current and previous quarter.

Plan approval numbers have increased from 11,632 at the end of 2016-17 Q4 to 12,991 by the end of 2017-18 Q1, an increase of 1,359 approvals.

As at 30 September 2017 there were 232 children with a confirmed ECEI referral bringing the total number to 13,223. Overall, 251 participants with approved plans have exited the Scheme.

Of the 232 children with a confirmed ECEI referral as at 30 September 2017, 222 were previously confirmed as ECEI at 30 June 2017 and an additional 10 entered the gateway this quarter.

In the quarter of 2017-18 Q1 there were 1,882 plan reviews. This figure relates to all participants who have entered the scheme (including transition).

Cumulative Position

There are two charts. The first chart displays the comparison between the cumulative plan approvals and the bilateral estimate per quarter. The second chart displays the number of plan approvals by participant referral pathway.

As at the end of 2017-18 Q1, the cumulative total number of participants receiving support was 13,223 (including 232 children supported through the ECEI gateway). Of these, 4,554 transitioned from an existing State/Territory program and 466 transitioned from an existing Commonwealth program.

In addition, 3,825 participants were awaiting a plan as at 30 September 2017.

Cumulative position reporting is inclusive of trial participants for the reported period and represents participants who have or have had an approved plan.

The following are the key statistics on the cumulative position:

112% of transition to date bilateral estimate met (1 July 2016 to 30 September 2017)

Participant Profiles

Page: 9

There are two charts. The first chart displays the number of participants with an approved plan by age group for the current quarter. The second chart displays the percentage of participants with an approved plan by the participant's age group. This chart compares the current quarter against all prior quarters.

Around 16% of participants entering in this quarter are aged 7 to 14 years. This is lower compared to prior quarters.

Due to the phasing schedule around 62% of participants entering in this quarter are aged over 15 years old. This is compared to 12% in the prior quarters.

Note: There are a low number of participants aged 19 and over who entered the Scheme in prior quarters.

Participant Profiles

There are two charts. The first chart displays the number of participants with an approved plan by disability group for the current quarter. The second chart displays the percentage of participants with an approved plan by the participant's disability group. This chart compares the current quarter against all prior quarters.

31% of participants entering in the quarter of 2017-18 Q1 have a primary disability group of Autism. This is lower compared to prior months.

Participant Profiles

Page: 11

A chart displays the percentage of participants with an approved plan by the participant's level of function. This chart compares the current quarter against all prior quarters.

For participants with a plan approval in the current period:

- 29% of active participants had a relatively high level of function
- 51% of active participants had a relatively moderate level of function
- 20% had a relatively low level of function

These relativities are within the NDIS participant population, and not comparable to the general population.

The figure on the right displays the amount and percentage of participants with an approved plan per the participant's gender group. This figure compares the current quarter against all prior quarters. The majority of participants are males.

A chart displays the percentage of participants with an approved plan by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders group. This chart compares the current quarter against all prior quarters. The demographical group with the highest amount of participants are the Not Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders group. The following are the key statistics for the current quarter on Aboriginal & Torres-Strait Islander Status

The majority of active participants are the Young People not in Residential Age Care group. The following are the key statistics for the current quarter on Young people in residential aged care status

Plan Management Support Co-ordination

Page: 13

Two charts displays the proportion of support coordination and plan management for participants. These charts compare the current quarter against all prior quarters. The majority of plans are fully managed by an agency.

The proportion of participants who are fully or partly self-managing their plan was lower in 2017-18 Q1 (25%) compared with the prior quarters of 2016-17 (27%), and 31% of participants who have had a plan approved in 2017-18 Q1 have support coordination in their plan, compared with 63% in prior quarters of 2016-17.

Plan Activation

Page: 14

The charts display the proportion of the duration to activate plans for the preceding four quarters.

Plan activation refers to the amount of time between plan approval and the commencement of the participant receiving support.

The percentage of plans activated within 90 days of approval were:

- 61% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q1
- 61% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q2

- 64% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q3
- 57% of plans approved in 2016-17 Q4

Plan activation can only be approximated using data on payments. As there is a lag between when support is provided and payments made, these statistics are likely to be conservative. That is, it is likely that plan activation is faster than presented. Further, in-kind supports have been excluded from the calculation, which further contributes to the conservative figures.

Note: Given that plans approved in 2017-18 Quarter 1 are relatively new, it would be too early to examine the duration to plan activation for these plans and hence these have been excluded from the charts.

Participant Outcomes

Page: 15

A table summarises the number of questionnaires for the key indicators for each of the seven Short Form Outcomes Framework (referred herein as SFOF).

Baseline outcome measures were collected from 98% of participants receiving their initial plan since 1 July 2016.

Of participants aged 25 and over:

- 65% choose who supports them
- 65% want more choice and control in their life
- 83% are happy with their home and feel safe or very safe there
- 38% were actively involved in a community group in the past year

For family/carers of children aged 0 to 14:

- 48% have a paid job
- 48% say they are able to work as much as they want
- 54% say they are able to see family and friends as much as they want

Participant Outcomes

Page: 16

A chart displays the percentage of participants by selected baseline indicators.

Key measures on baseline social, economic and independence outcomes. These will be monitored into the future.

Participants aged 0 to before school:

- 66% were able to make friends outside of family/carers
- 63% involved in age appropriate community, cultural or religious activities (highest compared with other age groups)

Participants aged 25 and over:

- 38% had a paid job

- 71% choose what they do every day

Participant Outcomes

Page: 17

A chart displays the responses to the question: 'Has the NDIS helped?' split into age categories and life domains.

Participants who entered the Scheme in 2016-17 Q1 and had their plan reviewed in 2017-18 Q1 were asked questions about whether the NDIS had helped them.

Percentage of participants responding yes were:

- Higher for 0 to school age participants, particularly for daily living (93%)
- Lower for the school to 14 age group

Participant Satisfaction

Page: 18

A chart displays the participant's satisfaction with the planning process rated as 'good' or 'very good' by quarter.

83% of participants rated their satisfaction with the Agency planning process as either good or very good in the current quarter. This has decreased since the second last quarter.

The Participant Pathway Review aims to improve the participant experience.

Participant satisfaction continues to be high, but has dropped during transition, compared with trial site experience.

PART 2: Committed Supports and Payments

Both committed and paid supports to participants are increasing in line with the growing scheme.

To date funding committed to participants with an approved plan amounts to \$553.7 million (including support periods in the future), of which \$231.3 million has been paid.

The \$553.7 million committed support includes \$354.9 million of supports in respect of prior financial years including trial, \$187.4 million of supports in respect of 2017-18 and \$11.4 million of supports in respect of later years.

Note: The \$187.4 million in respect of 2017-18 only includes approved plans to date, and not all of these plans cover the full 2017-18 year.

Note: The \$11.4 million committed in future years is due to current plans in place that have an end date past 30 June 2018.

Committed Supports and Payments

Page: 20

This section presents information on the amount committed in plans and payments to service providers and participants.

The following are the key statistics on Committed Supports and Payments:

\$553.7 million of supports has been committed to 12,991 participants

\$354.9 million of supports in respect of prior financial years including trial

\$187.4 million of supports in respect of 2017-18

\$11.4 million of supports in respect of later years

\$231.3 million has been paid to providers & participants

Overall, 53% of committed supports were utilised in 2013-14, 61% in 2014-15 and 62% in 2015-16. Currently utilisation is 55% in 2016-17, although this will likely increase as there is a lag between when support is provided and when it is paid.

The 2016-17 and 2017-18 experience is still emerging.

Note: The \$187.4 million in respect of 2017-18 only includes approved plans to date, and not all of these plans cover the full 2017-18 year.

Committed Supports and Payments

Page: 21

A table and a graph shows the comparison between the total committed supports and paid support for each year since scheme inception.

Committed amount by year that the support is expected to be provided, compared with committed supports that have been used (paid).

Of the \$553.7 million that has been committed in participant plans, \$231.3 million has been paid to date.

In particular, for supports provided in:

2013-14: \$5.8m has been paid

2014-15: \$30.7m has been paid

2015-16: \$64.9m has been paid

2016-17: \$103.8m has been paid

2017-18 to date: \$26.0m has been paid

Committed Supports and Payments

Page: 22

Two charts (including and excluding SSA) show the comparison of the distribution of average annualised committed supports by cost band for the current and previous quarter.

A greater proportion of initial plan approvals in 2017-18 Q1 have average annualised committed supports greater than \$30,000 compared with participants who entered in prior quarters when participants with shared supported accommodation (SSA) supports are included.

This is also the case when SSA participants are excluded.

This is reflective of the phasing schedule, where a higher number of existing adult clients entered the scheme in the latest quarter.

Committed Supports and Payments

Page: 23

A graph shows the comparison between the average annualised committed supports by age band for the current and previous quarter.

Average annualised committed supports increase at a declining rate up to age 25, and then stabilises to age 64.

The average annualised committed supports for participants at all ages has decreased in the current quarter. This is reflective of the phasing schedule.

Note 1: Average annualised committed supports are not shown if there are insufficient data in the group

Committed Supports and Payments

Page: 24

A graph shows the comparison between the average annualised committed supports by primary disability group for the current and previous quarter.

Participants with Multiple Sclerosis and Cerebral Palsy have the highest average annualised committed supports while participants with Other Sensory/Speech, Hearing Impairment and Developmental Delay have the lowest average annualised committed supports.

Participants with an initial plan approval in 2017-18 Q1 had higher average annualised committed supports across a range of disability types when compared with participants who entered in prior quarters.

This is likely to reflect the phasing schedules, where a higher number of existing adult clients entered the scheme in 2017-18 Q1.

Note 1: Average annualised committed supports are not shown if there are insufficient data in the group

Committed Supports and Payments

Page: 25

A graph shows the comparison between the average annualised committed supports by level of function for the current and previous quarter.

The average annualised committed supports generally increase for participants with lower levels of function.

The average annualised committed supports for participants with an initial plan approval in 2017-18 Q1 is higher compared with participants who entered in prior quarters for participants with a low level of function, higher for participants with a medium level of function, and lower for participants with a high level of function.

Note 1: Average annualised committed supports are not shown if there are insufficient data in the group.

Note 2: High, medium and low function is relative within the NDIS population and not comparable to the general population.

Committed Supports and Payments

Page: 26

A graph shows the comparison between the utilisation of committed supports by the year that the support was expected to be provided.

Utilisation of committed supports by year that the support was expected to be provided as at 30 June 2017, compared with 30 September 2017.

As there is a lag between when support is provided and when it is paid, the utilisation in 2016-17 and 2017-18 will increase, the latter significantly so.

The utilisation of committed supports has increased for supports provided in 2016-17. This is due to payments in 2017-18 Q1 for supports which were provided during 2016-17.

PART 3: Providers and Markets

The scale and extent of the market continues to grow, with a 15% increase in the number of providers during the quarter to 1,331.

Providers and Markets

Page: 28

This section contains information on registered service providers and the market, with key provider and market indicators presented.

Provider registration

- To provide supports to NDIS participants, a service provider is required to register and be approved by the NDIA.
- Providers register with the NDIA by submitting a registration request, indicating the types of support (registration groups) they are accredited to provide.
- Providers are approved to deliver disability supports and services to participants of the NDIS if they have at least one registration group approved.

How providers interact with participants

- NDIS participants have the flexibility to choose the providers who support them.
- Providers are paid for disability supports and services provided to the participants.

The following are the key statistics:

1,331 approved providers

75-95% of payments made by the NDIA are received by 25% of providers

34% of service providers are individual/sole traders

Therapeutic supports has the highest number of approved service providers, followed by early intervention supports for early childhood and assistance products for personal care and safety

Providers and Markets

Page: 29

There are two charts. The first chart displays the number of approved services providers over a time period (since December 2016). The second chart displays the type of service provider split into individuals/sole traders and company/organizations over a time period (since December 2016).

As at 30 September 2017, there were 1,331 registered service providers of which 451 were individual/sole trader operated business while the remaining 880 providers were registered as a company or organisation.

The number of approved service providers increased by 15% from 1,153 to 1,331 in the quarter.

34% of approved service providers are individual/sole traders.

Providers and Markets

The figure displays the proportion of active, not yet active and inactive providers.

Change in the activity status of providers.

As at 30 September 2017, 50% of providers were active in the last quarter, 43% were yet to have evidence of activity and 6% were inactive. Of the overall stock of providers, 175 providers began delivering new supports in the quarter.

Registration Groups

Page: 31

A chart displays the approved providers by the changes in registration group and percentage over the quarter.

The increase in approved providers from 30 June 2017 to 30 September 2017 varies by registration group.

Therapeutic Supports has the highest number of approved service providers and has seen a 14% increase since the previous quarter.

The largest percentage increase in approved providers was for the Specialised Disability Accommodation registration group in the quarter. This was followed by Support Coordination, Innovative Community Participation and Household Tasks.

Market share of top providers

25% of service providers received 75-95% of the dollars paid for major registration groups.

25% of providers have received 83% of payments during the quarter of 2017-18 Q1 for Assistance with Personal Activities.

89% of active participants with a plan approved in 2017-18 Q1 access mainstream services, a decrease from prior quarters. Participants are accessing mainstream services predominantly for lifelong learning, health and wellbeing and daily activities.
