LAC services focus on participant capacity building, including plan development, implementation and review. ECEI services deliver outcomes for children and their families through best-practice and family-centred approaches.

The NDIS will provide 460,000 Australians under the age of 65 with a permanent and significant disability with the reasonable and necessary supports they need to live an ordinary life.

The third Partners in the Community grant round is now open and will close at 2pm AEDT, Wednesday 22 November, 2017. An industry briefing webcast about the Partners in the Community Program will be available in late October. The panel will discuss key information about the program and the application process.
